

#### **Ensuring access to primary health care services**

IMA ensures access to primary health care services in some of the world's most fragile areas. Our approaches strengthen health systems and foster resilience.

#### Promoting maternal and child health

We promote attended birth and delivery at health facilities, access to immunizations, malaria treatment and prevention, and other lifesaving health services for children.

#### Promoting HIV prevention, testing and treatment

IMA helps prevent the spread of HIV through patient testing, counseling and treatment services, and behavioral change campaigns.

# Promoting nutrition through behavioral change campaigns

IMA works to help caregivers understand proper nutrition from conception to age 2 to ensure healthy cognitive and physical development.

#### Curbing and treating preventable disease

Our work to distribute medicines and supplies aims to eliminate neglected tropical diseases, malaria and others, and we help communities care for those affected.

# Responding to and preventing sexual and gender-based violence

From emergency medical assistance to counseling and community re-integration, survivors receive a holistic approach to care that helps them move forward.



#### Leading

IMA leads by empowering local governments and organizations to address their own public health challenges. Working alongside these partners, IMA helps them to develop the skills and ownership to implement their solutions. It takes time, but the results are far more effective and sustainable, maximizing our impact while minimizing our footprint.



We worked to empower faith leaders across East Africa with resources to combat HIV stigma, and to promote testing and treatment.

We installed mobile technology to capture data that informs realtime decision making in Tanzania and the Democratic Republic of Congo.

IMA strives to provide the most effective and technically sound solutions to the world's toughest public health challenges. That means we are always learning—examining data, exploring new innovations and seeking feedback from our partners and the communities we serve to ensure our programs have maximum impact for those in need.



Learning

This year, we secured a record number of academic presentations thanks in part to partnerships with Tulane and Brigham Young Universities.

In Indonesia, IMA brought together government, civil society and advocates to learn from our shared extensive experience promoting healthy nutritional practices.



#### Looking ahead

The work we do today lays the foundation for the progress we can make tomorrow. A huge part of our work takes place behind the scenes: training local people and strengthening local organizations to build resilience ahead of challenges like disease outbreaks or political instability. As we look toward a new year, we are also excited about how IMA is applying our past experience to reach more people in new and bigger ways.



This year—at the end of its first year of implementation—the Addressing Stunting in Tanzania Early or ASTUTE program received an A+ rating from its funding agency, the U.K.'s Department for International Development.



Beating malaria in South Sudan means we distribute mosquito nets and medicines ahead of the rainy season. Our networks allow us to distribute regardless of instability.
